Abstract: I develop and defend a novel principle of agency called the principle of the "Fixity of the Independent" (or "FI"). FI holds, roughly, that if a fact is in no way explained by an agent's current behavior, then the fact is currently beyond the agent's control or "fixed." I argue that FI is the best explanation of more familiar principles of agency, such as the principle that every past fact is beyond our control, or that the laws of nature are beyond our control. According to FI, the past and the laws are beyond our control precisely because they are in no way explained by our current behavior. Importantly, by seeing FI as the more fundamental principle, we get interesting results in various debates about freedom: while FI implies that causal determinism would threaten our freedom, it suggests that neither a fully determinate future nor the existence of an essentially all-knowing being would.
